Bill was born in London, England, on July 21, 1926, to Marie D'Hollander Blair and Archibald McPhail Blair. He came to the United States in steerage when he was three years old, after a stay in Belgium with his mother's family. He grew up in Bayshore, NY, where his love of boating, fishing, and clamming developed. He graduated high school in 1946, after taking time off to work and keep food on the table! He worked in construction, at a diner, and as a car mechanic before he met his love, Joan G. Worzel, on a blind date. They married on November 11, 1951; lived in Holbrook, New York; then moved to Oakdale, New York, in 1965. Bill worked for more than 30 years at the Long Island Lighting Company as a meter reader, in customer service, and in 'revenue protection' - figuring out how much to charge those who stole electricity.

Bill and Joan had four children: William Jr., Marc, Vivian, and Eleanor. Bill and Joan chaperoned school trips, attended the kids' sporting events and recitals, and helped a great deal with homework.

They kept everyone together though ongoing challenges in health, school, and life. After Bill's retirement around 1990, mom and dad along with William Jr, Marc, and Vivian, all moved to Oriental, NC..
